DECORATING THE BATH ROAD UTILITY BOXES

ADRIAN PHILIPS WITH NEWS OF THE LATEST REFRESH

he Bath Road is a very special shopping street, full of independent traders, great shops, restaurants, pubs and cafes. But if it is to thrive, then residents need to use the excellent services that it provides – and also help to ensure it looks good. Nineteen boxes were decorated in 2014, but Rhys has just finished a refresh. A number of boxes have been added to the scheme, others have been entirely repainted, and others again have been cleaned, with any scratches or deterioration attended to. The decorated boxes can now be seen along

So that's why, over the past 5 years, three residents' associations (St Philip and St James Area Residents' Association [SPJARA], the Naunton Area Residents' Association [NARA] and Cheltenham Connect) have undertaken a number of small environmental schemes to brighten up the Bath Road, with financial support from the council. Cheltenham College joined the group in 2019.

A number of small scale projects have been undertaken (including tree planting, planters and an art work). But the biggest project is the decoration of 25 utility boxes belonging to Virgin Media, BT Openreach and Glos Highways. These employ colourful designs inspired by the Victorian tiles in a butchers' shop in the Bath Road, the cedar trees in front of Cheltenham College and Victorian glass in the nearby St Philip and St James church.

The work was designed by Chantal Freeman and executed by Rhys Cowe.

the entire length of this part of the Bath Road, all the way from the Norwood Arms to the Suffolk Road traffic lights. As part of the same scheme, the Norwood Arms roundabout has been branded with the Bath Road logo.



A VICTORIAN CHILDHOOD

AN INSIGHT INTO HOLST'S EARLY LIFE

aura Kinnear, curator at the Holst Birthplace Museum, gives us an insight into Holst's early life, reflected in the museum's current exhibition.

What was Gustav Holst's childhood really like? We almost certainly will never know, although it's generally assumed that it wasn't an especially happy one. Firstly, his mother died when he was only seven years old, a horrendous tragedy for both

him and his younger brother Emil, which would have impacted on them throughout their lives. Moreover, it seems that his father Adolph wasn't always the easiest of individuals. According to Theodore von Holst, Gustav's nephew, 'Children in

the von Holst household were expected to be seen and not heard, and those who offended against this or other rules would be punished in various ways, including confinement to their rooms on a diet of mealy-pap' (maize porridge). However it was Adolph who was responsible for introducing Gustav to music. The young Holst attended All Saints' Church, where his father was choirmaster, and he sang in the choir; when he was older he assisted his father at concerts at The Rotunda and The

Corn Exchange. Nevertheless the divisions were there between father and son. As Thorley von Holst, Gustav's half-brother, recollected: 'Gustav departed radically from his father's wishes in the field of music', adding that their father had wanted Gustav to 'establish himself in Cheltenham as an assistant in a piano conservatory, a post which Gustav declined.'

Gustav's childhood story is just one we are exploring in our most recent exhibition, 'A Victorian Childhood', which runs until 14 December. Through toys, books, costume and photographs, visitors can reflect on what childhood may have meant to the boys and girls who grew up in the 19th century. What was infancy like, both for the baby and the nervous parents who would have been all too aware that their child might die before it reached five? And if they were fortunate enough to survive infancy, what world did they enter into? Of course, it would have differed greatly depending on whether their background was rich or poor, or like Gustav Holst, something in between. By the time Gustav was born, the 1870 Education Act had come into place, so although not all children went to school for a variety of reasons, it was now much more likely that a child would have had some sort of education, however patchy. Gustav famously disliked games and mathematics when he attended Cheltenham Grammar School.

As part of the exhibition we have created hands-on areas for our younger visitors. In the exhibition room we've constructed a Victorian school room, where visitors can write and sketch and get some idea of what a schoolroom may have been like, and in the Learning Space children will be able to immerse themselves in the world of Alice in Wonderland and Treasure Island – two of the most popular Victorian children's books.

MUSICA VERA

FEEDBACK FROM GRANT RECIPIENTS

ngela Walker, secretary of Musica Vera, tells us about the amazingly varied programme at a recent choral workshop organized by the choir.

Musica Vera held a most enjoyable and inspiring choral workshop at Bethesda Methodist Church on Saturday 18 May. This event was made possible by a generous grant awarded by Cheltenham Arts Council. The workshop was led by the Choir's Director of Music, David Dewar, and Hilary Davies of the Natural Voice Network.

The afternoon began with David getting everyone on their feet for physical and vocal warm-ups before introducing the singers to different types of choral music. We started with plainsong and looked into some elements of its notation – following this with everyone singing (using plainchant notation) Qui Creavit Celum, aka The Song of the Nuns of Chester.

In the second session, Hilary introduced us all to Natural Voice techniques. She then taught us a folk song from Dalmatia, Croatia, before getting everyone dancing and singing a traditional South African song in the Xhosa language. This session enabled everyone to learn pieces without using music notation.

In the final session we started with a setting of the Lord's Prayer in Russian. Then David led the singers through music by Thomas Tallis and Anton Bruckner, explaining as we went along how to make the most of the music by using the right vowel sounds for both music and language together with aspects of ensemble and vocal technique to bring out the intent of the music. We thus were able, in the course of the afternoon, to give everyone some experience of singing in Latin, Croatian, Russian, Xhosa, and English – a challenge to which all rose creditably and with enthusiasm.

The Choir would like to thank everyone who came along on the day, thereby helping to make it such a successful event. The majority of attendees were visitors, so that the Workshop served a larger community of singers in Cheltenham rather than only members of Musica Vera.

CHELTENHAM GERMAN CLUB

CELEBRATING 70 YEARS OF EXISTENCE

ne of Cheltenham's most popular foreign language clubs is celebrating its 70th birthday in September 2019.

It is not known exactly when the German club first started in Cheltenham, but it is generally assumed that members have been meeting regularly since at least 1949. One of the longest serving members, John Kennet, joined in 1957, became Treasurer in 1960 and was elected Chairman in 1965, then Secretary in 1995. He "retired" in 2010 but remains an active member, having served on the Club's committee for 50 years!

The "Deutsche Klub", as it prefers to be known, organises regular monthly talks and events covering a wide variety of subjects to do with the German-speaking world. It is perhaps unusual in that the members, who are mainly British, generally converse in German, some fluently, others using as much of their limited knowledge of the language as they can manage.

The German Club might in fact be much older than 70: the club's website reports that in 1935 a solicitor named George Booy attended a meeting of the "German Club". Four years later, in 1939, a wedding party was apparently held at the "Austrian-German club". Does this make it the oldest language club in Cheltenham?
